When Bill & Kim first started attending, their enthusiasm was encouraging. Rarely did this young couple miss our Wednesday evening prayer meetings. They not only participated in the discussion, but frequently asked good questions that opened up further considerations. When they transferred their membership to Grace, their humble faith shone clearly. Since then they have been a blessing to our body, and they will be missed.

Claude Halbach was a different sort of person. Because he felt uncomfortable in large groups, I didn't get to know him when I first arrived in Sheboygan. At our first family visit, this quiet man said very little to satisfy my curiosity. Our rela-

tionship began slowly and remained in slow-motion until he was diagnosed with leukemia.

Since that diagnosis, I have come to know Claude – or “Mike” as he liked to be called. We had many talks in his room on the 12th floor of St. Luke's Hospital in Milwaukee. And as he opened up to me, I began to see a man of quiet convictions and firm beliefs. When his body decayed, his spirit grew stronger and his faith burned brighter. He loved his church, and wanted very badly to be back in worship with his spiritual

family. For a time he was able to attend again, and his firm handshake at the door after worship told me he was very glad to be back.

Having finished his second round of chemo-therapy, he was physically wearing out. His body was drained, though his spirit remained undaunted. He longed for his heavenly home, and on August 31, 2010 his wish was granted.

Mike is gone now. No more trips to St. Lukes... no more friendly chats... change has struck again.

If you're like me, you don't want things to change. How desperately we try to hold on to things as they are right now – we fight change. But still it comes – rolling in like an irresistible tide – this is a changeable world that we inhabit.

Rev. John Ro— Chicago Evangelist

Reverend John Ro, our OPC church planter in downtown Chicago, was born in South Korea and came to the USA with his parents at the age of four. Initially the family lived in New Jersey, but as many immigrants soon moved onto California where John spent most of his childhood years. In college he became increasingly aware of God's call on his life, and therefore entered Talbot Seminary in California. Listening to a professor lecture on eschatology (the study of the end times), he found he was unable to square the teaching with the Scriptures.

In his confusion, he began to read reformed writings, particularly those of James Montgomery Boyce, one of the clearest Bible teachers of our era. In these he discovered a framework of biblical interpretation more consistent with the Scriptures. John therefore transferred to Westminster Seminary in Escondido to continue his preparation for the gospel ministry, where our former intern, Ken Golden, was his classmate.

John's wife, Wenny, grew up in Chicago and it was to her home city that Lord led them to serve. In 2008 he began his labors in evangelism part time, and then with presbytery support, full time in 2009, establishing Gospel Life Presbyterian Church.

The Sunday during General Assembly week, Ken Golden and I attended worship there. Our OPC Florida Keys evangelist, Bill Welzien, preached and as well, demonstrated his evangelistic methods during Sunday School. Our regional home missionary, Rev. Jim Bosgraf, always attentive to church plants, was also in attendance. It was a meaningful worship experience with excellent fellowship afterwards. By all means, consider joining sisters for worship when you are in the Chicago area.

Currently attendance at Gospel Life Presbyterian Church runs between 20-30, with about six Moody Bible Institute students and four additional students from other colleges. August is

their last month to meet at a local high school, Michelle Obama's alma mater. Beginning in September they have arranged a lease of a storefront facility, recently renovated for their purposes, located between Soldiers' Field and China Town. In addition to Sunday am worship and Sunday School, the church meets as well on Sunday and Wednesday evenings.

Rev. Bosgraf told me John is wonderfully gifted in mind and heart as an evangelist. As evidence of this, John has worked to position himself on the board of the high rise apartment where he and Wenny live so that he has opportunity to meet people whom he may influence for Christ through social events and activities. One such program he has established is the Gourmet Supper Club, where the appreciation of good food may be an avenue to share the gospel.

John, with whom I spoke recently, knows the work called God has called him and others to is occasionally on our weekly prayer sheet, and he is very appreciative of our intercession. He wanted us to know that their church has a website called "gospellifechurch.org", an excellent one I might add worthy of being checked out. There you can sign up for a monthly newsletter in order to keep abreast of God's favor on the church, and as well, know how to pray. Praise God for this young man, Rev. John Ro, and those standing with him who so want to reach Chicago for Christ.

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Book Review of Ashamed of the Gospel by John MacArthur

In this book John MacArthur addresses the disturbing practices and unbiblical convictions that the evangelical church of the West has embraced over the last 100 years. MacArthur extensively quotes C.H. Spurgeon and repeatedly references the Down Grade controversy that Spurgeon struggled against in the late 1800's. Using this as a background and the fact that history proved Spurgeon correct, MacArthur outlines the errors and dangers of today's church growth movement, the emergent church, and modern evangelistic practices. After a significant study of the early church in the book of Acts and Paul's teachings to the church in Corinth, MacArthur details the characteristics of the early church. Sound instruction, a consistent call for repentance, and turning from sin were the marks of the church Christ was building. Example after example is given of how the attacks against the church over the last 100 years have come subtly from within rather than from blatant heresy. The modern church has avoided the model laid out in

Scripture and latched onto the entertainment and marketing efforts of the world. As many in the church have focused on making the unbeliever comfortable, uncomfortable topics such as sin, hell, holiness, and the cross are moved far off to the side. Today's church is ashamed of the gospel. Love and acceptance is preached, while biblical truth and doctrine is avoided. MacArthur examines the subtle teachings that brought about the Down Grade controversy and how they played out over several decades in England. The result was the complete downward slide of mainline denominations into liberal theology and worldly compromise. America today is the England of the late 1800's, only on a much larger scale. MacArthur is careful to spend several sections on the biblical remedy to the current situation. Lengthy instruction is given on the promises in Scripture in regards to the true church. The reader is assured that Christ will certainly build His church. The most recent printing also includes an extensive explanation of the Down Grade controversy in its appendix.

Trust

“*Trust in him at all times.*” Psalm 62:8

Faith is as much the rule of temporal as of spiritual life; we ought to have faith in God for our earthly affairs as well as for our heavenly business. It is only as we learn to trust in God for the supply of all our daily need that we shall live above the world. We are not to be idle, *that* would show we did *not* trust in God, who worketh hitherto, but in the devil, who is the father of idleness. We are not to be imprudent or rash; that were to trust chance, and not the living God, who is a God of economy and order. Acting in all prudence and uprightness, we are to rely simply and entirely upon the Lord at all times. Let me commend to you a life of trust in God in temporal things. Trusting in God, you will not be compelled to mourn because you have used sinful means to grow rich. Serve God with integrity, and if you achieve no success, at least no sin will lie upon your conscience. Trusting God, you will not be

guilty of self-contradiction. He who trusts in craft, sails this way today, and that way the next, like a vessel tossed about by the fickle wind; but he that trusteth in the Lord is like a vessel propelled by steam, she cuts through the waves, defies the wind, and makes one bright silvery straightforward track to her destined haven. Be you a man with living principles within; never bow to the varying customs of worldly wisdom. Walk in your path of integrity with steadfast steps, and show that you are invincibly strong in the strength which confidence in God alone can confer. Thus you will be delivered from anxious care, you will not be troubled with evil tidings, your heart will be fixed, trusting in the Lord. How pleasant to float along the stream of providence! There is no more blessed way of living than a life of dependence upon a covenant-keeping God. We have no care, for he careth for us; we have no troubles, because we cast our burdens upon the Lord.

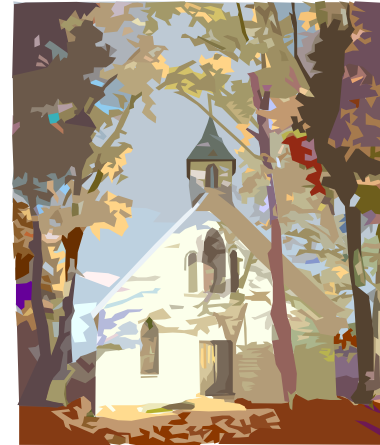

Cucumber Gyro Sauce

- ★ 1 cup seeded, chopped cucumbers

Assemble sandwiches as follows: lay slices of bread on cookie sheet. Pour melted butter over the bread & brush to coat. Arrange tomato slices in a single layer on the bread and shake garlic salt & dried oregano over to taste. Top with sliced or shredded mozzarella cheese. Broil in oven until cheese is lightly browned. Enjoy!

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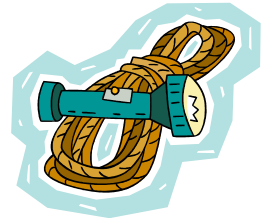
Spurgeon Corner

"I'll go down if father will hold the rope," was the offer of a Highland lad, when a traveler wanted him to reach the eggs of a wild bird which had built on a rocky ledge. The boy felt that there would be no danger if the rope was in his father's hand, for he had a powerful arm, and a loving heart, and would not leave his own child to perish.

Timid believers are afraid to begin to work for Jesus. To teach in the Sunday-school, to commence a Tract District, to visit the cottagers, to preach on the green, any of these seem to them to be too arduous and difficult. Suppose they were to look up to their Heavenly Father, and rely upon his promised aid, might they not venture? It cannot need much courage to rely upon Almighty strength. Go, dear friend, to thy work, and *thy Father will hold the rope.*

Unbelief is apt to foresee terrible trials as awaiting us upon our road to heaven. Your position will be, so fear tells you, like that of one hanging over the raging sea, by the side of a precipitous cliff; but there remember the eternal love which will be your unfailing support. You may hang there without the slightest fear, for *Father will hold the rope.*

The awakened sinner dreads the wrath of Heaven, and fears that his eternal ruin is inevitable; but if he has learned to depend alone upon the Lord Jesus, there is no room for further alarm. The Lord Jehovah has become the salvation of every soul that has laid hold upon the hope set before him in the Lord Jesus. The great matter no longer rests with the sinner after he has believed, the weight of his soul's eternal interests hangs upon Jesus the Saviour. The eternal arm which never wearies, will put forth all its power to uphold the trusting ones; and every believing sinner may sing in joyful security, though Satan should set all hell boiling beneath him, for *the great Father holds the rope.*
