Providence begins with a God who is holy, wise and powerful. He is the Sovereign Lord who made the world and all things in it. He is the One who upholds all things by His powerful word, and in whom all things cohere. This God has ordained whatsoever comes to pass, and who alone has the power to make all things meet their appointed ends.

The power of this Omnipotent God is always guided by holiness and wisdom. He is never out of control, nor does He do anything which is evil, wicked or unrighteous. Moral rectitude marks all of His actions, for He cannot transact anything which is unholy.

Thus does the great God preserve and govern all His creatures and all their actions. He has so ordered their existence and their activities to serve His

own glory. This includes the entire human race in their individual, familial and national existence. He governs men and nations, we say.

It also encompasses all other living creatures – insects, birds, fish, reptiles, land animals, and livestock. God

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6 Tips for Reading the Bible with Your

Happy Childhood Memories

When we look back on our childhoods, among many other happy memories, we may recall our parents reading with us. "Jack and the Beanstalk," "Little Red Riding Hood," "Three Little Pigs," and multiple other children's classics cast a warm hue upon our earliest recollections.

So why don't we do the same with the Bible? Why don't we read the Bible one-on-one with our children? Wouldn't it be wonderful to give our children that best of memories? If you haven't started such a practice, let me give you some guidance to start the ball rolling.

1. Give them a good reason to read the Bible.

Students do best when they are motivated by the ultimate aim of their studies. That's why it's so important to answer the "Why?" question up front, and to keep it in front, when reading the Bible with our children.

"Why are we doing this?"

"We're reading the Bible together because we want to know and love God, and live our lives for his glory and the good of others." That's my purpose statement. Yours may be slightly different, but without it, we won't sustain the practice of reading the Bible with our kids. And let's remind them of that glorious purpose continually, so that they too can catch the motivation.

2. Establish a routine.

Like everything else in life, reading the Bible with our kids is much more likely to happen if it becomes part of our routine. It takes about 6–8 weeks to build a habit by doing something at the same time in the same place with the same person. There will be ups and downs in that period, with times of forgetfulness and catch-up, but it will eventually become part of the fabric of life.

Reading the Bible with our kids is much more likely to happen if it becomes part of our routine. Try to find a slot in your schedule that you can commit to, push through the first 6–8 weeks, and you and your children will have formed a holy habit.

3. Be realistic.

As someone who once tried to teach my hyperactive five- and six-year-old sons Hebrew, believe me, I know the folly of unrealistic expectations. That lasted about four days. And that's about how long many of our Bible reading plans last, too. We set Everest goals and don't even get to base camp. It took me many years to grasp the limitations of my children's minds when it came to my spiritual ambitions for them. However, by the time the boys were about ten or eleven, I'd drastically lowered my goals, and then it began to click. We read less, but learned more.

4. Be systematic.

When I was young, if I ever opened my Bible, I did so randomly and just read some verses here and there. The result was a patchwork of Bible knowledge with no sense of an overall story, and no sense of connection between the passages, the chapters, the books, or the Testaments.

When reading the Bible with our kids, let's do so systematically, reading whole books of the Bible

together over time. Doing so will teach them to wrestle with harder passages, expose them to the whole counsel of God, and forge connections within books, between books, and between the Testaments.

5. Ask good questions.

Asking our children questions about what they read increases their concentration, cements the content, and helps them to apply it to their lives. When children are young, the focus should be on content using the familiar *what*, *where*, *when*, and *who* questions. The aim is to build up their store of Bible knowledge. As our children get older, we can ask questions more focused on the meaning and implications of the passages.

Two questions I've tried to keep asking my kids are: "What does this teach us about God?" and "What does this teach us about salvation?" Again, I hope that, by repetition, these questions become part of the fabric of their thinking processes. Other general questions might include, "What does this teach us about sin . . . the world . . . the Christian life . . . mission and evangelism?" and so on.

We should also invite questions from our children, although they will sometimes ask silly questions or perhaps even stump us from time to time. We mustn't do anything that will stifle their inquiries and even when they strike us out, we simply say, "I don't know but I'll find out." Then open Matthew Henry's commentary or a good study Bible and make sure you do get back to them with an answer.

6. Ask God for help.

By praying before reading the Bible, we demonstrate to our children the need for heavenly help if we are to benefit from our reading. We show our dependence upon God as we ask him for light on his Word. After reading together, why not help your children to turn what you've read into prayers. What in this passage can we turn into a praise, a confession, a thanksgiving, or a request?

The aim in all this is to establish patterns and habits that will eventually result in them reading the Bible independently with profit and pleasure.

God Of the Audible

Did you ever have a day when you started with an idea of what the day would have in store (appointments, activities, tasks to be accomplished, etc.) and you soon realized that your "plan" was just that – "a plan?" At the end of one of the day, you realize the overlap between your "plan" and reality is non–existent? (It's like a Venn diagram that resembles grandma's spectacles.) There's a reason the wisest man to have lived penned these words, "In his heart a man plans his course, but the Lord determines his steps."

Wednesday was THAT day! Susan (not her real name) stepped into our building at 9:10 am, accompanied by a man (later identified as the baby's father) and two children. We were expecting Susan on Wednesday, just not at 9:00. For a very specific reason, we had scheduled Susan for the 11:00 appointment slot that morning.

Susan had called the Center on Tuesday asking if we performed abortions at Anchor of Hope. All of us take a deep breath and say a silent prayer when we are asked that particular question. Because the conversation started with this question, Cassie, who answered the phone, knew that she was a high-risk client and heavily leaning toward making a decision to terminate her baby's life. Our team's goal when initial contact is made with an abortion-minded caller is to establish rapport, helping the client feel that she is not alone, and to schedule an appointment for options counseling and an ultrasound. This appointment generally lasts for 1.5 hours. Cassie executed her role with grace and brilliance and she was able to accomplish both goals, scheduling Susan for 11:00 am on Wednesday, the earliest time our medical room and medical staff would be available due to other scheduling appointments.

Now you see where this is going. When Susan stepped through our doors Wednesday morning with her crew in tow, our "plan" for the day was foiled. For you football fans, we were now "running an audible." It was too late to call the 10:00 appointment and reschedule. There simply was not enough time to listen carefully to Susan and allow her to process out loud everything going on in her life influencing her potential decision to abort before the 10:00 appointment arrived. But it also didn't seem reasonable to ask this abortion-minded woman

(with her two children and the baby's father) to "come back later" when it was more convenient for us.

I am so thankful that nothing takes God by surprise. We were certainly surprised, and quite frankly a bit on edge, about how all of this was going to play out. Our "plan" had been orderly and concise, down to scheduling times, resources, client movement, etc. For those of us who like things well-ordered, schedules are wonderful tools that help us operate with great efficiency and peace of mind.

When everything was said and done, we did go through the intake process and options counseling with Susan shortly after 9. The 10:00 appointment did NOT show up. Susan was able to have an ultrasound and saw her 8-week-old baby. Her heart was moved and her mind WAS changed as she decided to carry her baby. What God saw at 9:10 am on Wednesday (or before the beginning of time), we were able to see at 11:30. What God allowed us the privilege of seeing and being a part of was a life saved and a mom's heart changed and encouraged to carry her baby. I hope each one of you reading this knows that you were a part of that day with us! Your daily prayers DO change lives and hearts. Your financial support DOES allow us to open our doors for clients like Susan to walk through. Your encouraging words do LIFT us up when we've suffered a loss. So, from the bottom of our hearts – THANK YOU! But, more importantly THANK GOD for being in control of our life's "audibles." We wouldn't have it any other way. But we also welcome the days when our "plan" does resemble God's plan just a bit more.

Chapter 11: Things Not Worth Trying

That is a wise old saying, "Spend not all you have, believe not all you hear, tell not all you know, and do not all you can." There is so much work to be done that needs our hands that it is a pity to waste a grain of our strength. When the game is not worth the candle, drop it at once. It is wasting time to look for milk in a gate post, or blood in a turnip, or sense in a fool. Never ask a covetous man for money till you have boiled a flint soft. Don't sue a debtor who has not a penny to bless himself with-you will only be throwing good money after bad, which is like losing your ferret without getting a rabbit. Never offer a mirror to a blind man: if a man is so proud that he will not see his faults, he will only quarrel with you for pointing them out to him. It is of no use to hold a lantern to a mole or to talk of heaven to a man who cares for nothing but his dirty money. There's a time for everything, and it is a silly thing to preach to drunken men; it is casting pearls before swine. Get them sober and then talk to them soberly; if you lecture them while they are drunk, you act as if you were drunk yourself.

Do not put a cat on a coachbox or men in places for which they are not fitted. There's no making apples of plums. Little minds will still be little, even if you make them deacons or elders. It's a pity to turn a monkey into a minister or a maid-servant into a mistress. Many preachers are good tailors spoiled, and capital shoemakers turned out of their proper calling. When God means a creature to fly, He gives it wings; and when He intends men to preach, he gives them abilities. It is a pity to push a man into the war if cannot fight. Better discourage a man's climbing than help him to break his neck. Silk purses are not to

made out of sows' ears, and pigs will never play well on the flute, teach them as long as you like.

It is not wise to aim at impossibilities—it is a waste of powder to fire at the man in the moon. Making boards out of sawdust is a very sensible scheme compared with what some of my London friends have been aiming at, for they have been trying to get money by buying shares in companies; they might quite as soon catch the wind in a net or carry water in a sieve. Bubbles are fine fun for boys, but bubble companies are sharp-edged tools that none should play with. If my friend has money which he can afford to lose, there is still no reason why he should hand it over to a set of knaves. If I wanted to get rid of my leg, I should not get a shark to snap it off for me. Give your money to fools sooner that let rogues wheedle you out of it.

It is never worthwhile to do unnecessary thongs. Never grease a fat sow or praise a proud man. Don't make clothes for fishes or coverings for altars. Don't paint lilies or garnish the gospel. Never bind up a man's head before it is broken or comfort a conscience that makes no confession. Never hold up a candle to the sun or try to prove a thing which nobody doubts. I would advise no one to attempt a thing which cost more than it is worth. You may sweeten a dunghill with lavender water, and a bad living man may keep up a good character by an outward show of religion, but it will turn out a losing business in the long run. If our nation were sensible, it would sweep out a good many expensive but useless people, who eat the malt which lies in the house that Jack built; they live on the national estate but do it little service. To pay a man a pounds earning a penny is a good deal wiser than' keeping bishops who meet together by the score and consult about the best way of doing nothing. If my master's old dog was as sleepy as the bishops are, he would get shot or drowned, for he wouldn't be worth the amount of the dog tax. However, their time of reckoning is nearing, as sure as Christmas is coming.

Long ago, my experience taught me not to dispute with anybody about tastes and whims; one might as well argue about what you can see in the fire. It is of no use plowing the air or trying to convince matters of no consequence. It is useless to try to end a quarrel by getting angry over it; it is much the same as pouring oil on a fire to quench it or blowing coals with the bellows to put them out. Some people like row—I don't envy their choice; I'd rather walk ten miles to get out of a dispute than a half-mile to get into one. I have often been told to be bold and take the bull by the horns; but, as I rather think that the amusement is more pleasant than profitable, I shall leave it to those who are so cracked already that an ugly poke with a horn would not damage their skulls. Solomon says, "Leave off strife before it be meddled with," which is much the same as if he had said, "Leave off before you begin." When you see a mad dog, don't argue with him unless you are sure of your logic. Instead, get out of his way; if nobody calls you a coward, you need not call him a fool—everybody knows that. Meddling in quarrels never finds answers: let hornets' nests be alone, and don't pull down old houses over your own head. Meddlers are sure to hurt their own characters: if you scrub other people's pigs, you will soon need scrubbing yourself. It is the height of folly to interfere between a man and his wife, for they will be sure to leave off fighting each other and turn their whole strength upon you—and it would serve you right, too. If you put your spoon into other people's broth and it scalds you, who is to blame but yourself?

One thing more, don't attempt to make a strong-minded woman give way, but remember:

"If she will, she will, You may depend on it. If she won't, she won't, And there's an end to it."

The other day I cut out of a newspaper a scrap from America, which shall be my endpiece: "Dip the Mississippi dry with a teaspoon; twist your heel into the toe of your boot; send up fishing-hooks with balloons and fish for stars; get astride a gossamer and chase a comet; when a rain storm is coming down like the cataract of Niagara, remember where you left your umbrella; choke a flea with a brickbat! In short, prove everything hitherto considered impossible to be possible but never attempt to coax a woman to say she will when she has made up her mind to say she won't.

Ice Cream Pie With Warm Blueberry Sauce

Ingredients:

- 1 store-bought refrigerated piecrust
- 2 cups fresh blueberries
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1/8 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 2 pints vanilla ice cream

Instructions:

- Heat oven to 375° F. Coat the bottom and sides of the tart pans with cooking spray, vegetable oil, or butter.
- Divide the piecrust into 4 portions and roll them out so they're slightly larger than the pans. Press the dough into the pans. Run a rolling pin over the tops to trim the excess dough. Line the dough with parchment paper or foil, fitting it up the sides. Fill with pie weights, dried beans, or uncooked rice. Place the pans on a baking sheet and bake for 10 minutes. Remove the weights and paper and let cool.
- Meanwhile, in a saucepan, over medium heat, cook the berries, sugar, water, cornstarch, and cinnamon until the sauce thickens slightly, 5 to 6 minutes.
 Remove from heat and cool slightly. Remove the crusts from pans and transfer to serving plates. Place 1/2 pint of ice cream in each tart. Spoon some sauce on top.
