THE ONE-AND-ONLY

Among the sacred cows of our day is the concept of pluralism. The Oxford English Dictionary defines pluralism as "a condition or system in which two or more states, groups, principles, sources of authority, etc., coexist."

There are some respects in which pluralism is commendable. At a summer cookout, there will be some who enjoy burgers and others who prefer brats. For the burger lovers to coexist with the brat enthusiasts is good and right – to each his own! It would be foolish to suggest that burgers are good and brats are

evil. It is merely personal

preference.

But it is a whole different matter when it comes to religion and theology. Isaiah strongly challenges idolaters who preferred "other gods" over Jehovah:

Isaiah 45:²¹ "Declare and set forth your case; Indeed, let them consult together. Who has announced this from of old? Who has long since declared it? Is it not I, the LORD? And there is no other God besides Me, A righteous God and a Savior; There is none except Me. ²² "Turn to Me and be saved, all the ends of the earth; For I am God, and there is no other.

The fact of the matter is quite clear – there is one and only one God. He is the Lord – Jehovah – the great "I am." There is no god beside Him, and anyone who claims to worship some other deity is deceiving themselves.

As the One-and-Only God, He has a

unique claim on the worship, devotion, love, obedience and service of all men. After all, He is their Creator and Sustainer. They owe their very existence to Him and Him alone.

Not only is He the Unique Creator and Sustainer, but He declares Himself to be "a

righteous God and a Savior."
Therefore He calls and He commands all the ends of the earth to "turn to Me and be saved." He alone can and does save those who turn to Him in repentance and faith. No one else can do so, because there simply is no other god.

The matchlessness of God must be remembered as we live our lives in a pluralistic

society. Voices all around woo us to tolerate any and every other god as legitimate contenders to the throne of heaven. We are urged to accept Islam, Buddhism, Hinduism, Mormonism, New Age Spirituality and even Satanism as morally equivalent religious options.

If we dare voice any criticism of any other religion or sect or cult, we are branded as intolerant bigots who deserve to be voted off the island by the "tolerant" majority. And thus Christians are effectively cowed into silence.

Yet the One and Only God has not changed, nor will He ever relinquish His utterly unique status. And He still commands all people in these words: "You shall have no other gods before Me."

Let us stand fast by reality – There is none except Him – the True God – the One -and-Only!

Song Thoughts

From the Book of Psalms

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Psalm 9

The subheading in the NIV for this Psalm tells us that Psalm 9 is a hymn written by David. The hymn was presented to the director of music to be used most likely for worship in the Temple. It is interesting to note that the tune, "The Death of the Son", was specified to sing it. It would be more interesting to actually know what this tune was like and be able to sing beautiful Psalm in its original musical rendering. The fact that Psalm 9 is a true and pure hymn of praise and is meant to be sung adds a particular dimensional tone to its meaning and importance.

The Psalm begins with a high level of praise to God.

"I will praise you, O Lord, with all my heart;
I will tell of all your wonders.
I will be glad and rejoice in you:
I will sing praise to your name, O most high." Vv. 1, 2

These words are words of praise to the highest level. To understand this thought it is important to think about what "praising" is. When God is praised, his name is lifted (raised) up. When God is praised, his people are recognizing who God is in all his attributes. Then God is glorified! When God is glorified expression of thankfulness are more meaningful and valuable.

By David's example he raised his praise to God with his voice—he sang. That is what one does when he/she sings praise. God wants each individual to use his/her mouth. He does not want his people to meditate their praise to him nor fold the hands and bow the head and praise God in silence.

We who are benefitting from this Psalm of praise must not have the idea that singing praises to God should occur only in church during the worship service. Expressing praise with the voice is appropriate anytime the heart senses a reason for it. After all, the praise David expressed in the Psalm did not happen first in his church (the Temple) but happened first in his private moments.

Why did David sing his praises? He did this because he was happy and joyful in his heart (v. 2). It can be said that his rendering of praise was genuine because of the happiness and joyfulness he experienced was in his heart. This is why he could say, "I will praise you, O Lord, with all my heart."

Verse 2 says that David was happy and joyful which makes him sing songs of praise. In verses 3 through 12 David sings about what caused him to burst out expressions of praise. What precipitated these outbursts? David looks back and remembers God's goodness to him; he cites many great works that God did in his life.

- God turned back David's enemies v. 3
- David knew that God was on his side during his times of trouble v. 4
- God judged righteously in dealing with David's enemies v. 4
- God judges the whole world righteously v. 8
- God governs with justice v. 8
- God was a refuge for David v. 9
- God did not forsake David when he was in trouble v. 10
- God did not ignore David's out cries for help vv. 10, 12

In church worship do we not sing, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow?" Praise comes from our lips when we stop for a minute to remember specific blessings God has given us in our life because he is faithful in his work. God wants to know that we know and recognize the specific ways he has blessed us.

Consider praising God day by day, hour by hour. As we do our daily responsibilities, expressing praise to God is a good thing to do when we recognize that something happened or did not Volume 5, Issue 6 Page 3

happen because God was with us. Recently I was parked in a supermarket parking lot. When I was done shopping, packed the purchases into the car, and was backing out of the parking space to leave, I stopped the car because I was out far enough to make the needed turn and proceed forward in order to leave the parking lot. When the car was stopped, I was shocked when I looked out the rearview mirror and became aware that a black SUV had momentarily pulled behind me waiting to pull into a parking space on the opposite side being vacated by another car. I realized immediately that had I decided to back up just a little more to give myself just a little more room for swinging forward I would have put a large dent in the SUV's rear side door. I recognized that there was definite cause right then and there to praise God and thank him for intervening to prevent the inevitable accident. Then there is Anna of French descent from Louisiana. She and her husband moved to Texas in order to minister to the poor Mexicans in Donna Texas and over the border in Mexico. Kate and I met her during our volunteer work for a huge food pantry to prepare and distribute food boxes to the poor. Anna was always happy and was always aware of God's goodness. She always could find a reason to "Praise Jesus" which she spoke many times. Every time volunteers showed up to either pack the food boxes or distribute them, Anna would greet you with "Praise Jesus! Thanks for coming."

One of the beautiful things that David does in this Psalm is relate the praise to prayer. He does this in the second part of the Psalm, vv. 12-20. David offers a prayer to God in the last section of the Psalm.

How does relating praise to prayer work in David's mind? What is the connection? Looking back to the first section of the Psalm David's vocal outbursts of praise came as a response from remembering God's wondrous works in his life during his times of trouble while King Saul was pursuing him in order to destroy him. Other troubles continued to plague David as well. David knew as we know and experience that trouble and trial continue to come to us throughout our life. David

knew that because God was faithful in being his stronghold and refuge (v. 9) he could depend upon him for help in the future. So David with great conviction prays that God would continue to do the same works for him again in the future. This teaches us that we can pray to God for help more than once. This demonstrates David's trust in the Lord. Notice the similarity of the specific things he included in his prayer.

- Lift me up from the gates of death v.13
- Continue to give David a joyful heart that remembers God's faithful work and praises Him for it v. 14
- God's continued justice in dealing with enemies vv. 16, 19
- God's righteous judgment of the wicked v.
- Again David asks God to continue to turn back his enemies v. 20

There is one very important point that our attention must be drawn to. The question must be asked, "What right do any of us including King David have to ask or expect God to do anything for us? How do we dare to lift the name of God up by praising him? Verse 13 is the key verse to teach us the answer. David did not approach God on the basis of any goodness in himself or anything he had done. He did not give himself any credit. He recognized that only God is good and merciful. All that God does for his people is done because he is a merciful God. David believed that he needed God's mercy because he was a sinner; so his first petition was to pray for God's mercy. This is the only foundation upon which David or you and me can petition God for anything and expect God to reward us. God's mercy through Jesus Christ is the only foundation which makes it possible for you and me able to "declare your praises of the Daughter of Zion and rejoice in your salvation."

Final thought: What is the chief end of man?" The Westminster Catechism reminds us that "Man's chief end is to glorify God and enjoy him forever." Remembering God's goodness and his

wondrous works leads us to praise him; praising him leads to glorifying him, glorifying God leads to enjoying Him.

Comments on Finances

General Fund receipts for April totaled \$12,366.66 as compared to the budget of \$12,408.20, while General Fund disbursements for April totaled \$11,388.94. April year to date General Fund receipts totaled \$48,571.28 as compared to the budget of \$52,734.70 (a shortfall of \$4,163.42), while April year to date disbursements of \$49,624.87 were \$3,109.83 below budget. Through the end of April, the General Fund has decreased by \$874.18. General Fund receipts through April were 1.9% below last year's total, while disbursements were 0.2% above last year.

Benevolence Fund Receipts for April totaled \$2,436.20 as compared to the budget of \$1,479.17. Year to date benevolence receipts through April totaled \$6,096.22, while the budget amount was \$5,750.00. Each month, \$475.00 is sent to Worldwide Outreach for the General Missions outreach of the Orthodox Presbyterian Church. In addition, \$200.00 is


sent each month to the Midwest Presbytery's Church Extension Committee. During April, \$2,450.00 was directed to the Hub-Spokes Missions Program (\$1,050.00 for the Wingards (on furlough from Uganda), \$1,000.00 for the Hopps (Haiti), and \$400.00 for Rev. Don Ritsman's missions expenses). During June, \$600.00 is scheduled to be sent to several seminaries (the recipients have not yet been designated) and \$600.00 is scheduled for the Kings Men support that assists churches in acquiring a building. Designated gifts for the Kings Men are above and beyond this \$600.00 amount.

Giving for the Capital Expansion Project through April has reached 39.4% of the projected amount. The outstanding Mortgage and Promissory Notes balance was \$171,362.44 as of the end of April 2010.

Turtle Cheesecake Bars

- ★ 2/3 cup butter/margarine, softened
- ★ 2 cups flour
- ★ 2/3 cup brown sugar
- * 1 cup chopped pecans

Mix together, reserve 1 cup for topping. Pat into a 9x13 pan. Bake 15 minutes at 350°. Cool.

Filling:

- * 2—8 oz. cream cheese, softened
- * 1 tsp. vanilla
- ★ 2/3 cup sugar
- * 4 Tbsp. milk
- ★ 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
- ★ 2 eggs

Additional Ingredients:

- ★ 1 cup pecans
- * 2 cups chocolate chips
- ★ 1 cup carmel topping

Mix together until smooth. Put on crust—1/2 pecans/chocolate chips & carmel topping than filling/ than other half of above and the 1 cup crumbs. Bake 25 minutes at 350°.

(Carmel topping can be made by boiling together 2/3 cup margarine and 2/3 cup brown sugar. Boil together 45-60 seconds. Let cool.)
