Reformation Faith

Those Christians who self-identify as "Reformed" and/or "Presbyterian" will sometimes talk about "the Reformed Faith." The idea conveyed by this jargon has to do with an objective body of theology which is characterized by certain distinctive ideas.

Often the Reformed Faith is equated with Calvinism, or the "five points" of Calvinism. The sovereignty of God in salvation is a core concept for the so-called Reformed Faith. Covenant theology is another very important component, as is Presbyterian church government. We could go on and on with principles, ideas and concepts filling out our list.

There is nothing wrong or bad about such thinking, or the verbiage that I'm describing. Scripture itself tells us to "contend earnestly for the faith which was once for all handed down to

the saints." (Jude 3) "The faith" in Jude's usage refers to a body of doctrines — an interwoven theology that is objective in nature. Certainly the history of the Reformation was an account of men like Luther and Calvin earnestly contending for that faith.

But there is another way to understand faith that also deserves our attention – the subjective response of the believer to the truths of God's Word and the Gospel. Reformed people believe in Christ – faith is very important to the Reformed community.

One of the overarching issues faced by both Luther and Calvin was that of justification. How is a sinful man made right with God? How can we be saved from the eternal damnation that we so richly deserve?

The Medieval Roman Catholic Church answered the question by proposing a system of works done in obedience to the commands and decrees of the church. It wasn't that they instructed their followers to obey the Bible. Rather, they were told to obey the dictates of the church hierarchy. That included such non-Biblical ideas as pilgrimages, relics, and indulgences.

The Reformers replied that salvation came not through obedience to rules (either human or divine), but rather through faith in Jesus Christ. Sola fide, Sola Christus, Soli Deo Gloria – by faith alone in Christ alone, to the glory of God alone! For Reformed Christians ever since, faith has been central to our understanding of

the Christian life. We are saved by faith in Jesus Christ, as He is offered to us in the gospel. That faith is apart from works done in obedience to the law. We do not believe that we can earn anything, but that Christ's obedience produced a righteousness which is imputed to us, and received by faith alone.

Furthermore, we walk by faith, not by sight. We live our lives in conscious dependence and trust in the one who loved us and gave himself up for us. Faith becomes the fountainhead of all the Christian graces that characterize our lives. More than

As I sit to write this article I decided to share a story I read during my devotion time this morning. I hope it touches and inspires you like it did me. It so spoke to me about who we, in this ministry, get to meet on a daily basis.

From Outcast to Evangelist

I was perhaps eleven or twelve years old when my dad came home one evening with some somber news. "They found Claude under a bridge this morning . . . he was frozen as hard as an ice cube."

Those words continue to ring in my ears all these years later. Claude was a homeless man who wandered in and out of our small southern Oregon logging town while riding an old ten-speed bicycle and carrying the biggest pack of earthly possessions you can imagine. I'm still amazed the man could pedal his bike without falling over under that load.

I'm sad to say that my friends and I referred to him as Dirt Claude due to the fact that he was filthy and carried the stench of someone who rarely saw a shower or bath. Though he couldn't have been more than thirty years old, Claude was missing nearly all of his teeth. This didn't prevent him from indulging in large wads of chewing tobacco, witnessed by the dark brown juices that dripped off his chin.

My dad chose to still show Claude dignity as a human being. If he saw Claude pedaling through town, he would pull his pickup to the side of the road where the two would talk for fifteen or twenty minutes. Before parting ways, Dad would almost always slip a twenty-dollar bill into Claude's hand. I know because I would usually watch while slinking down into my seat for fear of being seen by my friends.

My compassionate dad might have been the last kind face Claude saw before succumbing to the elements on a cold and lonely winter night. My father's actions eventually planted seeds of tenderness in my own heart toward those considered outcasts in society.

Upon landing on the other side of the lake, Jesus and his disciples encountered a screaming maniac who wasn't exactly helping the local tourism industry. No one had any answers for this man consumed by his own internal storm. It was a full-blown category 5 hurricane.

When Jesus asked the man his name, an eerie voice answered, "Legion," which indicated the amount of demons who took up residence inside. A typical Roman legion was made up of five thousand soldiers. Could it be that there were that many unclean spirits inside this poor guy? Regardless of the number, what kind of power had to be behind a man who could snap chains and smash shackles intended to subdue him?

At this point, I would have been hightailing it back to the boat. But the Son of God was about to calm his second storm of the day. In an instant, the demonic horde was evicted from their human house and now found themselves flying with pigs into the water. You might even call it the Great Swine Dive.

How do you repay someone who has taken you from a life of insanity to instant sanity? From being possessed to now being blessed? From hopeless to healed? With tears in your eyes, you beg and plead with the Teacher to allow you to follow him to the ends of the earth. "No," Jesus said. "I've had special plans for you all along. You're going to stay quite busy sharing your story with everyone here in this region."

Only with Jesus is it possible to go from outcast to evangelist in mere minutes.

Reflection: Do you know anyone like Claude in your area? How can you bring Jesus to the shores of outcasts in your neck of the woods?

With All Your Heart by A. Craig Troxel

Treasurer Update as of 9/30/2020:

We started the year with -\$3,365.12 in the General Fund and as of 9/30 we have a balance of \$10,458.94 with \$8,000.00 of this increasing being a transfer from the Capital Fund back in January. While the General Fund has increased, as of 9/30 we are \$485.39 short from a budget perspective and we have two larger expenses still coming up before the close of the year.

Pumpkin Pecan Cobbler

Ingredients

For the cobbler:

- 1 cup + 3 tablespoons all purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons <u>baking powder</u>
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup <u>granulated sugar</u>
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon <u>nutmeq</u>
- 1/2 teaspoon <u>cloves</u>
- 1/2 cup pumpkin puree
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup melted butter or vegetable oil
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla

For the topping:

- 1/2 cup <u>granulated sugar</u>
- 1/2 cup <u>brown sugar</u>
- 1/4 cup chopped pecans
- 1 1/2 cups very hot water

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. In a medium sized bowl, stir together flour, baking powder, salt, sugar and spices. Set aside.
- 3. In a smaller bowl, stir pumpkin, milk, melted butter and vanilla together to combine. Pour wet ingredients into dry ingredients and mix to create a thick batter. Pour into a small 8-inch casserole dish with high sides.
- 4. In a separate bowl, stir sugar, brown sugar and pecans together. Spread over the top of the batter evenly. Pour hot water over the entire thing {WITHOUT STIRRING A THING!} and bake for 40 minutes or once the middle is set. {Be sure to place on a baking sheet incase it bubbles over.} Cool 5-10 minutes before serving. Serve with more pecans and vanilla ice cream.

As a help to high thoughts of Christ, remember the estimation that Christ is had in beyond the skies, where things are measured by the right standard. Think how God esteems the Only Begotten, his unspeakable gift to us. Consider what the angels think of him, as they count it their highest honour to veil their faces at his feet. Consider what the blood-washed think of him, as day without night they sing his well deserved praises. High thoughts of Christ will enable us to act consistently with our relations towards him. The more loftily we see Christ enthroned, and the more lowly we are when bowing before the foot of the throne, the more truly shall we be prepared to act our part towards him. Our Lord Jesus desires us to think well of him, that we may submit cheerfully to his authority. High thoughts of him increase our love. Love and esteem go together. Therefore, believer, think much of your Master's excellencies. Study him in his primeval glory, before he took upon himself your nature! Think of the mighty love which drew him from his throne to die upon the cross! Admire him as he conquers all the powers of hell! See him risen, crowned, glorified! Bow before him as the Wonderful, the Counsellor, the mighty God, for only thus will your love to him be what it should.
