Reformed Heroes

One of my Reformed heroes is Bishop J.C. Ryle. Born in 1816 in England, John Charles benefited from the wealth and ease of his family's fortune. Ryle received a good education at Eton College, and then at Christ Church in Oxford.

While at Oxford he excelled in his studies and won renown as a standout in the game of cricket. It was during his Oxford years that he was converted to Christ.

Upon graduation, Ryle returned home and expected to inherit the family fortune.

Around this time his father was bankrupted through bad business practices, and the family fell from their privileged position. Providentially, God used those circumstances to direct JC away from a career in parliament and toward the Christian ministry.

In December, 1941 he was ordained as a minister in the Church of England (what we call the Anglican Church). He continued in fruitful ministry until shortly before his death in March 1900 – a 59 year ministry! The last twenty years of his ministry were as the first Bishop of Liverpool. During those years he cemented his legacy as a staunch evangelical who loved the Reformed faith. He also showed himself to be a true friend of the common man, preaching often to working men and women. He actively opposed and resisted the liberalizing trends in his own denomination, much as Dr. J. Gresham Machen opposed liberalism in the PCUSA.

Ryle was an evangelist at heart, preaching and speaking and writing to

the hearts of his hearers. He loved the gospel of Christ, and proclaimed it tire-lessly throughout his tenure. As the times changed, and the Anglican Church moved further and further from the Scriptures, Ryle was isolated and alone. He stood for

truth, though fewer of his fellow ministers were willing to stand with him. His own sons strayed from the faith of their father, two of them making no profession of faith whatsoever. His third son, Herbert, joined common cause with the liberal influences that his father so strenuously opposed.

After his death, Ryle was quickly forgotten. His theology was con-

sidered out-of-step with modern times, and the stands he took in the Anglican world were overwhelmed by his opponents. He was reckoned something of a theological dinosaur, and his books fell into disuse.

Around 1950, interest in the writings of Ryle was rekindled. By the 1970's, his books were circulating and having influence. In 2001 a biography of Ryle was published by Christian Focus Publications, and just this year another biography has been published by Iain Murray and Banner of Truth Trust. There is truly a Ryle Renaissance taking place, and I am heartily glad for it! The biographies and Ryle's books will benefit the church.

What do I like most about Ryle? Perhaps this: he speaks truth to my heart, and challenges me to be a more faithful Christian. Just recently I was listening to a recording of Ryle's book <u>Practical Religion</u>. His chapter on prayer hit me like a ton of bricks. Here is just a small sample, and I think you'll see what *Continued on pg 10*

Good News Jail and Prison Ministry: Finding Hope in Jail

Brandon was 11 when he first got in trouble. He went with some friends into a neighbor's house to steal another boy's toys. The trouble escalated into joining a local gang. At 16, he went to jail for pointing a BB gun at a guy, just to scare him. Soon Brandon was into alcohol and drugs with his friends. This led Brandon down the road to self-destruction. Being in jail has become a repeated event in Brandon's life. At 28, he now sits in jail, charged with attempted battery of a police officer, resisting arrest, and disorderly conduct.

This time, things are looking different for Brandon. "Why," you might ask yourself. Now there is a Good News Jail & Prison Ministry Chaplain at the jail. While Brandon was sinking in a state of depression, a chaplain came to visit with him. Here are Brandon's words as he recalls that visit.

"As I described my life to him, I knew he could see my pain (I couldn't stop crying). I saw tears in his eyes for me. I remembered thinking, 'Everyone that I loved won't even talk to me, but this stranger has so much love for me in his eyes. He cares about how I feel when no one else does. God must have sent him."

That day, right in jail, Brandon placed his faith in Jesus. I've personally seen so much spiritual growth in him. Now Brandon is trusting Jesus to help him overcome his struggle with alcohol. He is striving to live to please Jesus. All this was possible, because of two things. First, because of a God who loves him unconditionally. Second, because of a ministry that believes in sharing God's love with those who are incarcerated.

Every Good News Chaplain can share countless stories like Brandon's. Thousands of Good News volunteers could share many similar stories. These stories exist because there is an empty cross looming over history. A blood stained cross, where Jesus laid down His life as a payment for the sins of mankind. Joel 2:32; Acts 2:21; Romans 10:13, "Everyone who calls on the Name of the Lord will be saved" NIV

A Bit About Our Guest Speaker ...


Dr. Craig Troxel is the pastor of Bethel OPC in Wheaton, Illinois. He is also an author and an adjunct professor for Westminster





Comments on Finance

General Fund receipts for August totaled \$12,463.39 as compared to the budget of \$12,893.70, while General Fund disbursements for August totaled \$10,941.14. August year to date General Fund receipts totaled \$112,955.14 as compared to the budget of \$112,819.80 (an excess of \$135.34), while August year to date disbursements of \$104,382.04 were \$8,437.76 below budget. Through the end of August, the General Fund has increased by \$8,639.87. Year to date General Fund receipts for August were 9.8% above last year's total on an average Sunday while disbursements were 1.0% below the prior year. Benevolence Fund Receipts for August totaled \$1,293.00 as compared to the budget of \$1,360.42 (a shortfall of \$67.42). Year to date Benevolence Fund Receipts through August totaled \$10,694.51 and fell short of budget by \$188.82. Please refer to the graph for a historical trend of benevolence receipts as well as the current benevolence budget. During August, \$500.00 was sent to Worldwide Outreach (WWO) for the General Missions outreach of the Orthodox Presbyterian Church and \$200.00 was sent to the Midwest Presbytery's Church Extension Committee (CHEX). August Year to

Date giving for the **Capital Fund** was \$2,837.00. Please refer to the Capital Fund Graph that shows the historical giving for the years indicated in the graph. You may contribute to the Capital Fund by marking your gift as "Capital Fund" and placing it in the offering plate. Please note that the Capital Fund is used to pay for current and future needs that may exist to purchase additional equipment (such as computers, the sound system, tables and chairs, etc.) or building-type items (such as a parking lot, driveway, furnace boiler, etc.). Since some capital needs are quite substantial in nature, resources to finance and pay for these projects can take years to pay for them. Even though capital needs may not be large in the current year, we should wisely allocate our giving not only to current needs, but also to these future needs as well.

Happy art thou, reader, if this trust is thine! So trusting, thou shalt enjoy sweet peace now, and glory hereafter, and the foundation of thy trust shall never be removed.
